Nehemia is registered as a non-profitmaking, humanitarian foundation in Albania and is a branch of "NEHEMIA Christian Aid Ministries" with its centre in Nidda/Germany. Nehemia is working in almost 40 countries all over the world.

Nehemia Albania was registered on 20.02.1992 as association "NEHEMIA - SHERBESA E NDIHMESES KRISTIANE" by the Albanian Ministry of Culture.

On 01.08.1995 the legal status, according to Albanian law, was changed to HUMANITARIAN FOUNDATION "NEHEMIA".

During the unrest in March 1997 the premises of NEHEMIA were completely destroyed. Nevertheless the work went on, with many more social activities taking place than before.

Our centre is in Pogradec, a small town in the eastern part of the country, close to Lake Ohrid and the Macedonian border.

We have branches in the towns of Gjirokaster (Southern Albania) and Durres (Mediterranean Coast). In the summer of 1999 we opened a new centre in Malisheva/ Kosova.

As a non-profit-making organization we are almost exclusively financed by voluntary donations, mainly from Christians in Germany and Switzerland.

During the Kosova crisis we got considerable financial support from the German Foreign Affairs Ministry (Arbeitsstab für Humanitäre Hilfe) and AGRINAS. Thus, and through many additional donations from private individual and churches, we were able to care for thousands of refugees from March through July 1999.

Kosova Refugee Project '99: From March to July1999 members and co-workers of NEHEMIA Church in Pogradec, as well as in Durres and Gjirokaster, cared for thousands of refugees from Kosova. (See page 14) In these days regular activities and even church meetings were reduced to a minimum, as every hand was needed for practical help and personal care and crisis counseling for victims of the war.

Background: For economical reasons schools in faraway villages were closed. As there are no roads leading to the villages, children would have to walk more than two hours daily to attend school, which in wintertime would be impossible because of snow. Therefore CHW decided to open a boarding school, where the children can live during the week and attend the public school in Bishnica.

The "Qendra kulturore arsimore e femijeve" (Children's Education & Culture Center) has been founded in cooperation with the Dutch mission organization AGRINAS.

AGRINAS renovated the public Puppet Theater, which had been completely destroyed during the unrest in 1997, with assistance of NEHEMIA and other organizations. For 5 years these organizations are allowed to use these new premises.

Outpatients' Clinic:

In the outpatients' clinic in NEHEMIA Center Pogradec two doctors examine and treat patients (part time). Two nurses are caring for patients with minor wounds. Our medical personnel is on call for emergency cases in our private school and other work branches.

In 1999 an ultrasound scanner and an electrocardiogram were bought.

The clinic is also the base and organizational centre for outreaches of German medical teams. German doctors see patients there.

In summer 1999 MNA opened another branch in Malisheva/Kosova at the new NEHEMIA Centre there. Activities: > A Swiss nurse (*full time*) cares for patients

About 50 people from Germany formed 14 teams for voluntary medical outreaches in Pogradec.

NEHEMIA SOCIAL WORK

> The Old Peoples' Home in Gjirokaster received every month financial support for purchasing food.

> During the refugee project 15 people from Kosova, who stayed in the premises of the Old People's home, received full support from NEHEMIA.

> NEHEMIA's co-workers care personally for the occupants of the Old People's home through visits, organization of excursions etc.

> The NEHEMIA office in Gjirokaster moved to the premises of the Old Peoples Home in Summer 99.

Due to administrative problems, the contract with the appropriate Albanian authorities could not be signed yet. We hope to accomplish this in March 2000. From then on, the Old People's home will receive a considerable monthly financial support. Our staff, who is present full time, will supervise the work and give support in organization, medical training, accountant's training etc.

THE CHALLENGE:

In March 1999 Albania faced a serious crisis: Hundreds of thousands of Albanians had to leave their country as refugees, and poured into Albania - a country which itself is struggling with poverty and still suffers from the destructions wrought in 1997, when most of the public buildings were destroyed.

Overnight all over Albania churches, mission organizations and Christian humanitarian organizations started to cooperate, developing effective emergency plans to care for the refugees. Their often profound experience with relief work in Albania, motivated coworkers and hundreds of devoted church members formed a very effective workgroup.

In Tirana the "Crisis Centre" was founded by AEP (Albanian Encouragement Project) and VUSh (Evangelical Alliance of Albania), which helped to coordinate the projects on a national level.

NEHEMIA was part of this "task force", and started refugee projects in Pogradec, Durres and Gjirokaster, always in cooperation with other Christian organizations.

As virtually every hand was needed to meet the needs of thousands of people, NEHEMIA and its associate organizations CHW, MNA and Apostolic Church reduced their regular activities to a minimum, and most of the co-workers from the different work branches were fulltime engaged in the refugee project.

As in March the temperatures in Albania are often below zero degree Celsius and with no public buildings available where refugees could live, not to speak of the sanitary conditions, church buildings served as temporary camps, while private buildings were rented and public buildings renovated as fast as possible to serve as long term camps for the refugees.

The most urgent needs we had to take care of were:

- > Mattresses and blankets
- > Housing facilities
- > Hygiene
- (Sanitary conditions, hygienic articles) > Clothes
- > Food
- > Medical Care
- > Counseling and psychological care
- > School and education

Many special donations from all over the world and financial support from the German Foreign Affairs Ministry (Arbeitsstab für Humanitäre Hilfe) and AGRINAS enabled us to cover the huge additional expenses required for this project. Material support by the German "Bundesamt für Zivilschutz" (beds, mattresses blankets) met urgent needs.

Many helpers came from Germany, Switzerland, Romania, USA and many more countries and gave practical assistance in various ways.

We want to thank all our donors and helpers for their wonderful support, also in the name of our guests from Kosova, who really very much appreciated our help.

COLLECTIVE CENTRES: NEHEMIA/PEP established six collective centres in

NEHEMIA/PEP established six collective centres in Pogradec. In contrast to other Albanian towns the local authorities gave the entire organization of the refugee project into the hands of PEP. (Agreement with the towncouncil of Pogradec, 29.04.1999)

The premises of NEHEMIA Centre served as a "reception camp", where up to 250 refugees were welcomed and supported for some days, until other centres were equipped and made ready to move into. At NEHEMIA Centre they got medical treatment as well as warm food, the possibility to do their laundry, make telephone calls etc.

Every person got a mattress, blankets, plates and silverware, clothes, shoes and hygienic articles.

NEHEMIA/PEP rented an empty factory building and other premises and transformed them into collective centres. Military buildings, which were in very bad condition, were renovated and proper sanitary installations added. Kitchens were established in every centre, along with playgrounds, additional toilets and showers etc

KOSOVA REFUGEE PROJECTS in DURRES & GJIROKASTER

DURRES:

REFUGEE PROJECT:

- In cooperation with three other churches NEHEMIA Durres established a collective centre for 400 people in the town of Shijak

- About 800 refugees in host families in Durres got basic supplies (Food, clothes, hygienic articles etc.)

- A camp kitchen in Tirana got 15 tons of food

- Another collective centre for 180 persons was built for long-term shelter in cooperation with the organization A.M.E.N. Due to the quick return of the refugees, however, no refugees were received there.

AID FOR KOSOVA:

- Two trucks with 8 tons of food and 800 kg of literature were brought to Prishtina and distributed in cooperation with the local evangelical church (which had been supported by NEHEMIA for many years).

- 1 minibus was donated to a church.

- A truck (7,5 to.) was donated to the evangelical church in Prishtina

GJIROKASTER:

REFUGEE PROJECT:

- NEHEMIA Gjirokaster and "AEM", a local evangelical church, formed the "Komuniteti Ungjillore" with the goal to support refugees from Kosova.

- The "Komuniteti Ungjillore" cared for about 220 people with food and other needed supplies in two collective centres.

- NEHEMIA took over the responsibility for about 90 people, some of them living in host families, some in collective centres.

- 15 people living in the local Old People's Home got full support.

- Villages and camps got non-regular support with food.

In Gjirokaster the refugees arrived end of April, and returned by bus in August 1999.

AID FOR KOSOVA:

The co-workers of NEHEMIA Gjirokaster try to keep in contact with the people who returned to their homes, and help individually by financial aid and, if needed, by establishing contacts to existing churches and relief organizations.

After almost all of the refugees had returned from Albania to their destroyed home country, NEHEMIA decided to follow them, start new projects there and help actively in rebuilding the country of Kosova, where already for many years NEHEMIA had supported local churches.

A new NEHEMIA centre in Malisheva /Kosova was founded.

We chose Malisheva, a region which for a long time has belonged to one of the poorest areas in Kosova, and which suffered severely during the time of war. More than 90 % of the houses were destroyed and many people died during the fighting.

We were given the premises of an old agricultural building for our disposal, where we established our base with quarters for the staff and a big storage space for relief goods and building material. Missionaries from Albania, Switzerland and Germany moved in - though the lack of electricity, water and the presence of a lot of rodents make life there not very easy.

The foremost need was the rebuilding of houses and roofs before wintertime. NEHEMIA started a roof building project, and had repaired 100 roofs by Dec. 99 in surrounding villages. In cooperation with the local authorities and with the help of a local engineer we checked the living conditions of families, calculated the needed building material, purchased the material and had it brought to our centre. There the families picked up the material and repaired their homes themselves.

In addition to the building project, we distributed relief to families in neighbouring villages, and started with church meetings, home visits and personal spiritual care (crisis counseling) for many people.

MNA started their own project there:

- > Support of a local hospital
- > A nurse continuously cared for patients
